

Librarian-Faculty Collaboration: Effective Strategies for Embedding Online &

Face-to-Face Library Services

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Background

Embedded librarians are getting closer to their users through virtual integration into online courses as co-instructors or the equivalent with the cooperation or collaboration with the primary course instructor (Kesselman & Watstein, 2009).

- Using Discussion Boards for communication and interaction
- Embedded online library guides
- Online modules
- Online tutorials
- Synchronous sessions

Two Ways of Embedding

■ *Macro-level*:

- preexisting library resources are integrated as modules
- librarian and the instructor <u>cooperate</u>.

■ Micro-level:

- librarian collaborates with the instructor
- create customized library resources

Cooperation vs Collaboration

■ Cooperation when

- Relationships are structured
- Course librarian takes full control over embedded resources.

■ Collaboration

- Librarian is a co-instructor
- Direct and purposeful interaction with students.

Instructional Design Framework 1. Audience

- What are the audiences characteristics?
- How can you increase interactivity to reduce sense of isolation (Moore & Kearsley, 1996)
- Feedback considerations

Instructional Design Framework 2. Content

- How to organize and where to locate the online library materials?
- Learner support library video tutorials, i.e.:
 - how to conduct effective database searches
 - how to determine if a source is authoritative
 - Etc.
- Infoguides (LibGuides):
 - "Begin Your Research" box on the home page
 - "Find Articles
 - "Find Books" Virtual reference widget

Instructional Design Framework 3. Instructional Strategies

- Diversify interactive activities to engage learners
- Do not use long video tutorials or presentations
- Combine content presentation with online discussions
- Use locally relevant examples
- Be concise and use direct questions
- Use one-on-one discussions

Instructional Design Framework 4. Technologies

- Interactivity in Blackboard (Discussion Board):
 - Forum "Ask Your Librarian"
- Frequent group and individualized feedback (Discussion Board with Subscribe button, Kaltura, email, skype, GoToMeeting, etc)
 - Audio
 - Video
 - Combined
- Clarity of grading (Rubrics, syllabus and Blackboard Grade Center):
 - APA citation
 - Use of reliable sources

Instructional Design Framework 5. Evaluation

- Did learners achieve the course learning outcomes?
- Were embedded library resources and activities effective?
- Did learners meet course requirements?
