



Adapting Active Learning Techniques for Traditional Classroom Settings

Reasons to do active learning.

- · Students learn from each other.
- Students take responsibility for their learning.
- Valuable classroom time used for application.
- Students are more involved and enjoy class.
- Meet the learning outcomes for Mason general education courses and retain needed information.
- More fulfilling for the teacher and more fun.

Possible problems in active learning.

- · Students may feel uncomfortable.
- It can take several classes to change the culture.
- Creativity can open up new learning approaches.

How to adapt a traditional classroom to an active learning style.

- Rearrange the chairs to allow students to see each other.
- Ensure there is room for the instructor to move among the desks.
- Arrange for portable white boards to empower students.
- Move to a more public setting, e.g. outdoors weather permitting.


How to adapt teaching style to the classroom constraints.


- Use the "check-in" exercise.
