### Step 1: Identify the Goal and Learning Objectives

#### The Goal

Consider why are you are creating this video and the goal you wish to achieve. That will determine the course you take in creating and sharing your video.

#### **The Learning Objectives**

Your video can be a learning activity for your students. Ensure your video is aligned with your learning objectives.

# Types of Video to Engage Your Students





#### **Instructor Introduction Video**

- Record yourself on camera to introduce yourself to your students
- Share your interests and experiences
- Provide a brief course description
- Length: 1-2 min

**Video Announcement** 

- Record a screencast with your audio narration to make an announcement to your students
- Share an announcement to welcome your students to the course, introduce a week, wrap-up a week, clarify, draw connections, summarize, and synthesize.

Length: 1-2 min

#### **Learning Environment Video Tour**

 Record a screencast with your audio narration as you use your cursor to navigate students through the learning environment

 Demonstrate how to access external technology tools

 Provide a course description, expectations, and tips for success

#### **Mini Lecture Video**

- Record a screencast or slides of course content with your audio narration
- Share course content in small chunks with photos, graphics, video, and animation
- Use teaching strategies such as case studies, personas, and storytelling to engage your students

Length: 4-6 min





#### **Video Demonstration**

- Record video demonstrating a process, procedure, and activity
- Share detailed information with audio narration
- Length: 4-6 min

#### **Guest Presenters**

- Record video of guest presenters in live sessions
- Conduct an interview with one presenter or conduct a panel discussion with many presenters
- Guest presenters can be professionals in the field or past students

Length: 15-20 min



#### Video Feedback

- Record a screencast with your audio narration as you provide feedback on student assignments and assessments
- Provide comments and suggestions
- Share supplemental resources

Length: 2-4 min





#### Video Assignment

 Have your students record a video assignment with the Kaltura Capture software using a laptop webcam or mobile device

 Mobile videos can be uploaded via a mobile browser or the Kaltura Go mobile app

Length: 4-6 min

## Step 2: Organize the Course Content

#### **Organize the following course content areas:**

- presentation materials
- discussion materials
- learning activities and supporting materials
- assessments and rubrics

#### **Step 2:** Organize the Course Content (Continued)

#### Identify Content Areas Where Video Would Be a Good Option

Ask yourself the following questions:

- In which areas do students struggle with the most?
- Is the content too dense?
- When do students need to see a demonstration?
- Can I repurpose this video in another course?
- Does this Video Already Exist (e.g., YouTube, LinkedIn Learning, Publisher Material)?

#### **Step 2:** Organize the Course Content (Continued)

#### **Chunk the Course Content**

Break your course content down into manageable chunks in order to create 5-10 videos 

#### **Identify Design Elements**

Identify photos, graphs, charts, video clips, screencasts, etc to be used in your video 

#### **Step 3:** Write the Video Script

#### **Video Scripting**

- Video scripting works great for lecture videos. If you feel comfortable on camera and know your content well, then a bulleted list of talking points might be best for you.
- You should always think about the type of video you want to create and adapt your video • scripting process and needs to that type of video.
- Using a video script will assist you in telling a story that is organized and concise.

#### **Step 3:** Write the Video Script (Continued)

#### Writing a Video Script

Video scripts should contain at least 4 sections:

- The Hook
- The Intro
- The Body
- The Call To Action

#### **Tips for Reading Your Script on Camera**

#### **Teleprompter Mobile App**

In order to ensure that you are speaking naturally on camera, it's best to use a teleprompter mobile app. The BigVU teleprompter mobile app has been used successfully by Mason faculty.

#### Here are tips to make your video look as natural as possible with the teleprompter mobile app:

- Place your mobile device slightly above eye level on a tripod or flat surface.
- Practice with the speed and the text size

## **Tips for Reading Your Script on Camera (Continued)**

#### **Use Talking Points**


Talking points are a list of bullet points that contain the main ideas of your script. Having talking points on paper or on your mobile device will allow you to look more natural on camera.

#### Here are tips to make your video look as natural as possible by using talking points:

- Look at your list of each talking point one by one as you make your video •
- Edit the video removing the parts of the video when you are looking at your list of talking points
